# Growing and Maintaining a Positive Approach to Student Welfare

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is an evidence-based whole school systems approach to managing student welfare. The main aims of PBL are to:

- Address the diverse academic and social needs of every student
- Establish positive social expectations for all in the school community
- Provide a framework for the school and its community to support the wellbeing of every student.

When this is implemented well we see a shift in the school's culture because:

- Students have a deep understanding and respect for what is expected of them
- Staff are consistent when responding to student learning and behaviour
- Students feel safe and cared for at school and their parents, family and community are more involved in their school
- Unproductive and challenging behaviour is significantly reduced.

One way we measure the impact and success of PBL at Murrumburrah Public School is through an annual School-Wide Evaluation Tool (SET) which is completed by our external coach. At the end of term 2 staff, students, parents and members of our local community completed a survey that helped to evaluate how deeply our welfare systems and structures are embedded within our school and the school community. It looks at the various aspects of PBL including our reward systems, knowledge of the school values, how we respond to and manage behaviours as well as our decision making processes.



Pleasingly, the school has continued to show growth in all of these areas over the last 3 years and we are extremely proud to announce that we achieved a SET score of 100% in 2016.


This is a massive achievement that truly reflects the commitment of the school and community to the PBL welfare system.

Both girls and boys teams will now go and play in the NSW PSSA touch football Knockout Gala day in Wagga on Friday 19 August. Good luck to both teams.




